With the new year in and the season of sailing officially opened, (heralded by a breakfast and an abandoned cruise) the 2013 Exemplar Clipper Cup Regatta is once again on the radar.

John sailed in the original series and now 30 years later is a driving force behind the resurgence of the event in Port Douglas.

With such tradition to live up to now is the time for PDYC in 2013 to deliver a regatta worthy of the magnificent trophy and the international heritage of the Clipper Cup.

Dog Policies, Future Plans and Club Renovations

In response to a members enquiry the committee has agreed on a policy regarding dogs at the club. Having browsed the legalities there are no legal restrictions preventing dogs on the property relating to licensing laws or in our food service areas. This is because the whole place is classed as outside.

The committee came up with a simple policy aimed at keeping everyone happy (especially Deck Dog Roxy pictured below receiving the Christmas Cup in December).

Colin's Column

This is my first contribution to our wonderful newsletter, and my aim is to keep members informed of what is happening at the committee level.

The cyclone preparation night hosted by the Club was well attended, with over 60 people present. MSQ, Police, Coast Guard and SES addressed the audience and fielded questions.

Concerns were raised about the inadequacy of the catamaran mooring area due to the increase in the number of multihulls in Port Douglas. Advice has been received from MSQ about a catamaran area being available further upstream. See the noticeboard in the club for details. (This is particularly important to both myself & the Immediate Past Commodore!)

The committee is in discussions with both the Department of Natural Resources and Mines and the Cairns Regional Council over the state of the concrete blocks protecting our land from Dickson Inlet. Council, as the trustee for our lease with the Department are responsible for the works, however various permissions are required prior to commencement.

The committee has requested that Council install some lighting on the boat ramp adjacent to the club, and council have responded positively, advising that temporary 12V lights will be installed early this year.

Maintenance around the club is ongoing, with the safety gate installed on the pontoon ramp and a downpipe cut under the path to facilitate drainage away from the kitchen. A new, larger urinal has also been installed. Thanks to Ken, Vic, Graham & Graham for getting all this done.

Early in February a number of tripping hazards around the club will be attended to, and then in March works will commence on the new bar.

It would appear as though MSQ are enforcing the laws in relation to dinghies. A number of members have been booked, primarily for not having the correct wording on the tender. I have ordered 50 copies of the latest rule book and they are available at the club.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the clubhouse which was opened in December 1993. The committee has decided that the Christmas Party will also be our 20th birthday party, and we have invited Sir James Hardy (who officially opened the club in 1993) back to the celebrations. We will be attempting to contact as many former members as possible, and may need help contacting those members who have fallen off our mailing list.

We like it when the beer's cold, but who's counting anyway? Have you liked the club?












Miriama hosts marriage proposal

A tender subject for a fine day in a dinghy

Boating and Fisheries inspectors recently fined a member for not having the right identification on his dinghy.

According to Maritime Safety Queensland tenders to registered recreational ships are exempt from registration provided they are used within 2 nautical miles of the primary ship. However, the tender must be marked on the exterior with the word 'tender' and the primary ship registration numbers, at least 75mm high. If this is not possible, markings should be on the inside of the boat in the largest characters possible. If the tender is used for more than 1 ship, it may be marked with the owner's name.

The alleged offense was using the age old accepted TT to mean 'tender to' which is apparently no longer valid and not having the boats registration numbers. It's no longer acceptable to have the ships name. It must be the ships registration number such as 'Tender ABC123' for example.

Check your dinghy before it's too late and keep your \$250 in your own pocket!






