
Never Mind Politics - a week is a long

time in Sailing... Wednesday January 26th, Australia Day and for the Tin Shed annual Low Isles Race the yachts had to motor all the way out to Low just to keep up some boat speed, three days later the strong wind had the entrants in the Poseidon Sailaway Club Championship running for cover just before the start as the gusts hit 30+ knots. Then on Wednesday 2nd February WAGS was cancelled and the fleet was huddled up the creeks awaiting the possibility of 150 knot winds! All of this in one week! Thankfully the weather behaved itself the following week for some great sailing and a welcome return to the race calendar for the faithful.

Race Results

Sensational Summer Series Sailing

Race 2 of the Poseidon Sailaway Club Championship finally hit the waves on Saturday 12th after two cancelations due to inclement weather. The first scheduled run was rained out and the re-run was blown out of the water by strong winds. Eventually 7 yachts came to the start line with Gordon & Cheryl (Kai Lani) absent through work commitments and the Petrus' (Whitecap) unable to cross the Whyanbeel Creek. Excellent conditions prevailed for the 10 o'clock start with a triangular Olympic course chosen for the days racing. Doug Ryan on Magic set the pace with a finish time of 1:21:00 but it was not enough to stay ahead of Tim Preuss on Ann Sea and Garry White on the clubs J24 Port FM Mais Oui with both yachts on a tie on corrected time just 34 seconds ahead of Magic. The surprising tie shows how important every second can be as the difference in elapsed time between the fleet of 74m 40s was cut to just 25m 38s by the corrected times on handicap. Race 3 followed in the afternoon with Whitecap a starter but Magic unable through work commitments. The forecast easing of the breeze failed to happen and the fleet enjoyed fantastic conditions again with all boats bettering their morning times around the course. Elapsed time difference between first and last of 52m: 27s was reduced to 20m: 08s on corrected time. Ann Sea cut 5min 39 seconds off her time to take both line honours and handicap wins ahead of Port FM Mais Oui and Ice. A number of duals within the fleet are beginning to materialise between Karragun and Tau Ceti, Ice and Whitecap and Ann Sea and Magic with Port FM Mais Oui and Indigo in the mix making for some close quarter action. After 3 races Ann Sea tops the leader board on 4.5 points with Port FM Mais Oui 2nd on 6.5 followed by Ice (12), Magic and Karragun tied (14), Whitecap (20), Tau Ceti and Indigo tied (23) and Kai Lani (30). Insurance and the Strong Wind Warning

When asked the question does cover apply to a boat sailing during a current strong wind warning? Club Marine replied:

QUOTE:

There is no exclusion as such noted on the policy with regards strong wind warnings.

I guess due diligence should be adhered to as if there were to be a claim in this situation, questions would asked as whether the client has taken measures to minimize damage. UNQUOTE.

Not really a straight answer to a straight question but the inference is that if you don't need to be out then you probably shouldn't because your insurer may challenge your decision to deliberately increase the risk. They will of course accept the risk and apply a higher premium if one chooses to go down that path. The question then arises is the need to race sufficient to justify being out there?

May 21st & 22nd and 28th & 29th



Severe Tropical Cyclone Yasi



This NASA image shows Yasi approaching the coast at 1:35 p.m. Australian Eastern Standard Time on Wednesday Feb 2nd, 2011. Some interesting facts about cyclone Yasi: Yasi was named at 10pm on the 30th January by Fiji Meteorological Service. The meaning of the word Yasi is Sandalwood, as in the tree. A 5 meter tidal surge was observed at the Department of Environment and Resource Management (DERM) storm tide gauge at Cardwell. The highest rainfall total of 471mm was recorded at South Mission Beach. Yasi is one of the most powerful cyclones to have affected Queensland since records commenced. Maximum sustained wind speed estimated to be 205 km/hr (110 kn) with maximum estimated wind gusts of 285 km/hr (153 kn). Lowest central pressure 929 hPa taken at Clump Point, Mission Beach and also at the Tully Sugar Mill. Yasi finally weakened to a tropical low near Mount Isa around 10pm on 3rd February, 22 hours and over 800km after landfall.

The Chant of Jimmie Blacksmith

In the 1972 novel by Thomas Keneally Jimmie Blacksmith repeatedly evades capture finally succumbing to the inevitable tragedy of his ill fated destiny - in this real life story his name sake will evade the heartache of calamity to triumphantly sail on to a bright and happy future.

Having suffered damage to the mast and rig in the May 2010 Exemplar Clipper Cup

Jimmie Blacksmith sat for almost eight months in the marina. During that time proud owner, long time club member and former Rear Commodore Campbell Corbett spent countless hours in a labour

of love refurbishing and repairing his yacht.

The result was an amazing transformation in preparation for a long overdue voyage of adventure. On the morning of January 16th 2011 Jimmie sailed away from Low Isles taking Campbell and partner Desley Lloyd on their passage south along the coast for what they planned to be the trip of a life time. Only two weeks into that journey they found themselves at Port Hinchinbrook as first TC Anthony and then one of the most ferocious storms to ever cross the Australian coast both beared down upon them in frightening succession. The circumstances that led to their being there were unavoidable. In need of fuel and with nowhere else to turn they became caught awaiting a window of opportunity that never came. Having secured the boat to the moorings they sought refuge on the 3rd storey of an apartment block and waited in anticipation as

the rest of the nation and the world watched and waited as TC Yasi tracked towards the coast. Authorities told them they had to evacuate but without any

transport and no forthcoming assistance they had no option other than to sit tight and

hope. In Campbell's words the sight that greeted them the next day has to be seen to be believed. The rest we know from news paper and TV reports - the story of Campbell, Desley and Jimmie Blacksmith is told here by Campbell.

"As TV reports warned of a 7
meter surge plus waves we wondered
if the 3rd floor would be high enough"
Describing the devastation that the couple

witnessed Campbell told how his boat was in the middle of a mass of destruction stranded on the shore line. "The boats were still tied to the moorings and as the tides came and went the boats would move up and down and more damage was caused as this went on for two weeks before we could get to Jimmie". If the carnage from the storm wasn't enough there was more in store for the helpless yachts and their unfortunate owners! "Many boats sank as a result of this just adding to the problem. We couldn't do anything for about two weeks as we watched the tides rise and fall and the boats get smashed more and more". Damage suffered to Jimmie is extensive with the hull pierced in four locations, the keel snapped off, the rudder is bent, the new folding prop is destroyed and the transom is severely damaged. "It may yet be a write off but the new \$40,000 rig is OK so it looks

like they'll do the repairs". With the road closed in both directions and no means of travel the couple spent four days without running water as emergency response crews began the mammoth task of restoring essential services. "Power was finally restored after almost three weeks but you've got to hand it to these blokes here, every power line was down for miles around." Campbell recounted the story of the lone yachtsman that dared to stay aboard his yacht. "He was going to stay on board but when the winds really started to pick up he came ashore and sheltered in the ablution block but when the waves came in up around his knees he thought he'd better head for higher ground."Campbell gave an ominous warning to the many boats that head into the mangroves during the storms when asked if there were any creeks available for shelter. "There are mangrove creeks about two miles away but it was too far for us to get back, but mangroves aren't going to help you - the mangroves here have been rolled like slabs of turf, they just got lifted and rolled over. When it's a

category 5 it doesn't matter how much you love your boat there's nothing going to stop a category 5. You've just got to get out of there."

So what does the immediate future hold for Campbell and Desley? Well they're not going to let a bit of wind get in the way of their plans that's for sure. They plan to follow Jimmie down to Mooloolaba where the insurers say it'll take two months to get the boat back in the water. Campbell is a little less optimistic expecting at least four but once the job's done they'll spend some time just as they planned to, sailing around, maybe get involved with some local club racing and pretty much carry on exactly as they intended to - only just a little bit behind schedule.

Sea Snakes Sea Snakes on the Sea Shore

The bad news: Highly venomous marine reptiles inhabiting the warm tropical waters of the world - right here where we live! Because they must surface to breathe, Sea Snakes are known to frequent the shallow ocean waters of beautiful tropical coral reefs, just like those here, where we live! Sea Snake venom is Neurotoxic (affecting the nervous system) and sometimes Myotoxic (affecting skeletal muscles), what we have! A fatal dose is about 1.5 mg and most Sea Snakes produce an average of 10-15 mg of venom so they should always be approached with caution as this venom is 10x more lethal than the venom of the worlds land based nasties like the Rattlesnake, the Black Mamba or the Taipans. Sea Snakes have a reputation for being very curious and have a fixation for any elongated floating object such as the air hoses of deep sea divers or even a snorkeler's fins like the ones we use! Sea Snakes also present a high degree of danger to humans after tropical storms, like we have here, when they can be washed ashore becoming virtually helpless to move and extremely dangerous alive or dead.

The good news: Most Sea Snakes have a placid disposition (easy going troppo types like we are) and 75-80% of Sea Snake bites are "blank" non-productive bites meaning envenomation does not occur. As the bad far outweighs the good keep out of their way and remember that **every Sea Snake** is **highly venomous**.


Club History with Henry Cotter
