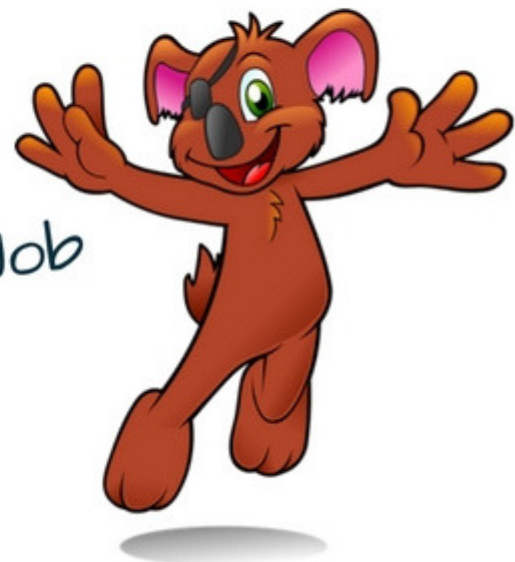

# Vale Perry.

Perry Allen was born in Australia on the 18th September 1962. He had his 55th birthday last week before finally surrendering after a difficult fight to an aggressive cancer. Perry was taken from this world on the 25th September 2017.

He was married for most of his adult life to his best friend Gail.

They moved into the Port Douglas community 5 or so years back and deciding to purchase a home here, as well as keep their home in the South Island of New Zealand in Wanaka. This allowed Perry to spend half the year in Port and half in Wanaka, giving him, as he explained, a perpetual summer life. They called both places home.

On arrival to Port, Perry immediately made his way to the PDYC where he became a valuable and active member. He was very keen to swell the club numbers with new and competent sailors. So, it was with Peter Chapman and Alf Fowler that they initiated and designed the 6 week learn to sail course on the club's J 24's. Perry gave his time and expertise generously. He instructed many would-be sailors during the 2015 and 2016 "Learn to Sail" course and was always ready to give his time for extra signing off for competency after the course. Perry had an extremely relaxed manner and was an accomplished sailor and excellent instructor. He brought many new and younger members into the club because of his enthusiasm and steady approach to teaching people the fundamentals of sailing, allowing non-sailors the opportunity to actually sail a yacht.

New trainees felt completely at ease on a boat with Perry. He had a way of giving just the right amount of instruction to keep you focused on the task at hand. He encouraged trainees to helm, to trim, to feel the wind on their face and neck and to always be mindful of the wind direction, to be alert and to be ready. His passion for sailing was infectious and he loved the Coral Sea. When you were in a boat with Perry you came to appreciate just how happy he was on the water.

Perry spent many hours at the club maintaining and repairing the J fleet. He was fastidious about keeping the boats in good order. He didn't wait for things to break, he would check and replace items that were a bit worn and have spares ready if they seemed on their way out. It was a regular sight to see Perry tinkering on his beloved "Mai Oui", screw driver, pliers and his quiet presence going about the task without need of recognition or acknowledgment.

Although relaxed and cool-headed, he was also fiercely competitive and played to win. He had a take-no-prisoners approach. A race meant just that, it was a race and you had better have your sailing skills finely tuned because "Mai Oui" had to be going as fast as she could possibly go.

But after the race had finished he resumed the happy relaxed, full of laughter and stories, friend that we all knew.

Before one race last year he was wearing, as he described, a brand new "super quick dry" shirt and shorts. After beating into the wind on the return from a passage race around Snapper, we were all cold and wet sitting on the rail as we headed for Port. After a particularly big dowsing as we crashed awkwardly through the swell and it broke on top of us, I turned to ask how he was sitting at the back of the boat in his new "super quick dry" shirt. He replied "Wish I had of got some super quick dry jocks!".

Perry was very special to many of us. He was an honest, salt-of-the-earth bloke, he avoided drama, he was a straight talking bloke who had a contented happy nature, a genuine smile, a real person with no hidden agendas. What you saw was what you got with Perry. He was a social creature and enjoyed company. He and Gail organised the J24 end of year parties and their hospitality is legendary both here and across the ditch.

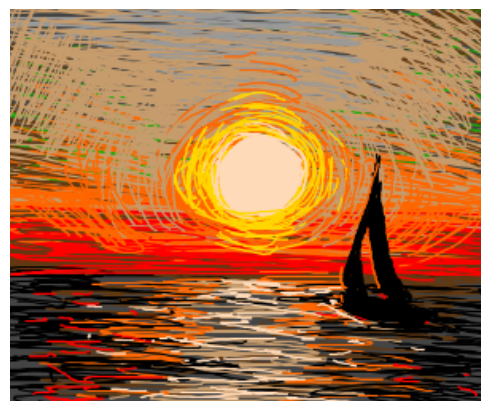

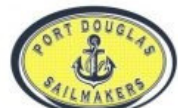
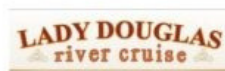

## Mick's Fiji Chilli Pickle

Ingredients: 250g Green Chillies 6 Lemons  
3 Tbsp Raw Sugar 1/2 tsp salt 3/4 tsp turmeric  
1 tsp cumin seed

Wash and thoroughly dry chillies

Toast cumin in a dry pan until fragrant, set aside and cool before grinding in a mortar and pestle or spice grinder.

Place sugar, salt, turmeric and ground cumin in a non reactive bowl.

Mix with the juice of one lemon to make a paste.

Slit chillies along one side with a knife and stuff with the sugar and spice paste.

Juice remaining lemons

Place chillies in a small non reactive pan and cover with lemon juice

Bring to simmer and simmer gently until chillies are tender and cooked.

Put in a clean jar and refrigerate.

Makes approximately 1 jar
