Dramatic events unfold as two yachts become beached during The Closehaven Marina Trophy Series on 11th August.

As one of the marker buoys drifted in the heavy seas Tau Ceti became tangled with the anchor line and within minutes was perilously close to the shore. Indigo immediately went to assist but was also caught out by the adverse conditions as both yachts ended up beached. A full investigation by PDYC into the episode identified a chain of events that led to the unfortunate event. Following this members have agreed on a plan for better safety and race management in the future.



After five races of the ten race Closehaven Marina Trophy Series Ann Sea tops the leader board on 14 points ahead of Port FM Mais Oui and Miriama Te Rua tied on 20. Ice (24) jumps into 4th as T-Break (34) slips into 5th ahead of Magic (39), Tau Ceti (42), Indigo (49), Winkali (52), Jimmie Blacksmith (55) and Sinabada (59).

Race Report: Two Island Sail & Run. With eleven entries and one late withdrawal ten yachts came to the start in gusty conditions and a strong swell. Starting in two divisions split by their handicaps the five yachts in division 2 set sail first at 11:00am eager to make up as much ground as possible before the 11:15 start for division 1. Indigo and Tau Ceti both suited to the rough conditions of the stage 1 reach to Low Isles set the pace followed by Miriama, Port FM Mais Oui and T-Break. Division 1 boats had their work cut out to run down the early starters but by the time the fleet converged on Low Isles both divisions had begun to mix.

Stage 2 was up to the athletes with the swim to Low Isle, a lap sprint around the sandy cay and a swim back to their boat an opportunity to split the fleet and trade some positions with their rivals. Indigo, Tau Ceti and Miriama were first to embark on stage 3, the starboard rounding of Low Wooded Island and a reach back to Four Mile Beach, hotly pursued by Magic, Ice and Jimmie Blacksmith. As the gusting sou'easter hit 23 to 28 knots the fleet rounded the islands and began the fast reach back to a gate off Four Mile Beach through which the athletes would swim to start stage 4, the sprint back to the yacht club via the lookout on Flagstaff Hill.

Closing in on Four Mile Beach Magic was first to drop their athlete having run down both Indigo and Tau Ceti coming in second and third followed by Ann Sea, Jimmie Blacksmith and Ice with Miriama, Port FM Mais Oui and T-Break not far behind. The fleet was cut to nine as Sinabada retired to limit further damage sustained to her headsail.


Final positions lay in the hands of the athletes as they made their way back to the finish line at the entrance to the club.

Crossing the line first Alistair Spence claimed a line honours victory for Magic followed by Peter Montgomery for Indigo and AJ for Ann Sea.

The race was not without controversy as the protest committee delivered five minute penalties to Ice whose athlete failed to swim the proper course and Jimmie Blacksmith for crossing a restricted line at the gate. Adding to that the time keeper of one team failed to provide sufficient times and was disqualified.


The third annual staging of the event set a new course record for Magic with an elapsed time of 2:59:25 shaving 07:35 off their previous record set in 2010.

Each stage of the event provided points for the teams to accrue that converted to cash prizes based on their performance at each stage with the sailing legs subject to handicap corrections. In addition to this medals and trophies were awarded to the first three placed boats in each division and Alistair Spence was declared the overall winner of the athletes and Magic (37) was declared the overall winner ahead of Tau Ceti (36) and Indigo (32).

Race Report: The Commodores Trophy. Four yachts contested the revived Commodores Trophy Race that forms race 4 and 5 of the Closehaven Marina Trophy Series. The trophy had been absent from the race calendar for several years and with names like Dr Dick and Sunburnt Snowflake, Red Boomer II and Fat Albert there is a rich history of racing on the shields that adorn the trophy commemorating previous winners.

Joining these illustrious names in 2012 will be Port FM Mais Oui following a first and a second in the two race event to take the overall title on 3 points ahead of Ice (1 & 3), Ann Sea (3 & 2) and Miriama (4 & 4).

The chosen course for each race was the infamous string of buoys. Used only on three previous occasions with the most recent having to be abandoned after only fifteen minutes and prior to that an ambulance awaiting the return of an injured competitor earlier in the year. Not to be discouraged by superstition the racers in the Commodores Trophy provided some extremely close competition with Port FM Mais Oui denied a first only nineteen seconds behind Ice in race 1. Then in race 2 again Port FM Mais Oui beat Ann Sea by just six seconds to take first place and secure the trophy.

The incumbent club Commodore Vic Petrus was onboard Andiamo to oversee the racing and present the prizes afterwards.

PDYC sailing members rally together for improved race management

The events of August 11th provided PDYC a chance to take a closer look at the way in which the sport of yacht racing is conducted at the club. As a famous yachting sports writer once said of the original '95 Mirage Resorts Clipper Cup " you need more than a bag of clubs, a couple of racquets or a pair of boots to partake in this sport".

Yacht racing is just like any other sport in that accidents can happen, things can break and things can sometimes go horribly wrong, only in our case the risk can be on a much greater scale.

How we approach our sport should perhaps be no different to any elite athlete or professional using only the best and most reliable equipment and having a full understanding of what they are doing. Pushing their body to the extreme to achieve their best, able to do so because they have learnt how to train properly and to prepare properly for what they do. We too should take the time to learn and prepare properly. We too should be using good, reliable equipment and most importantly we should all fully understand what we are doing. Not forgetting that this club was built for fun and we are enjoying the chance to go for a sail on the weekend. We must remember that we're playing with hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of equipment and playing in an inherently life threatening environment.

One of the clubs most experienced yachtsmen, Doug Ryan has suggested that planning in most cases reduces the risk, however prudent seamanship with trained or experienced crew is also a big part of racing and competing safely. So, in response to the events that unfolded on the 11th a meeting was held to discuss every aspect of that day and to map the way forward for a safer and stronger commitment to an otherwise very successful resurgence in yacht racing at the club.

Issues identified at the meeting included:

- 1. Purchase of new equipment:
 - New buoys with proper lines, anchors and weights and everyone informed of the correct way to rig, deploy and retrieve a marker buoy.
 - An effective rescue capability of our own with the club to pursue the option of providing a rescue/course laying boat.
- 2. Information sessions for those taking part:
 - New appointment of a training officer and a safety officer.
 - How to properly assist a vessel in distress.
 - Basic emergency response.
 - Understanding the Racing Rules of Sailing.
- 3. Better planning of future events:
 - A fully functioning sailing committee that meets on a regular basis to plan and prepare for upcoming events.
 - Shared responsibilty in planning and conducting each event.

Our catamaran Indigo became stranded on Four Mile Beach while assisting another vessel in distress on Saturday. We did not intend to be where we ended up nor for most of the day and the boat has suffered much damage due to the pounding sea. She lost both keels, her two rudders are bent at 90 degrees, and she was taking in water both over the stern and through the rudder compartments - more than we could bucket or pump out. We lost one motor due to water ingress, and had we not been towed off we would have been on the rocks within half an hour. There are many people to thank and we apologise if we have left anybody out.

Hola from Central America - the adventures of The Three Gringos

Club members Graham O'Dey and Maureen and Ron Shaw are travelling the world and have sent some reports of their travels keeping in touch with their friends back in Port Douglas. The following extracts provide an insight into their journey.

"Hi everybody, well we finally arrived in Mexico. We felt like we'd spent a week on planes, but it was really only 2 days. Between Guam and Honolulu we went from Sunday to Monday and back to Sunday! Our poor old brains couldn't keep up never mind our bodies, but we got back to normal, well as normal as usual, but you know us and Graham. Mexico had better watch out with us three gringos on the loose."

Mo complained that most travellers have their own laptops these days so the hotels don't have computers, just Wi-Fi which has slowed down the correspondence a little. Graham was reported to be still hanging in there despite "some backpackers leading him astray the other night, but he's back on deck today with no ill effects. We have been to Acapulco, but we didn't let any young beach babes whiz graham off, he'll thank us later, I think. We visited Puerto Escondido which is still on the coast but quieter than Acapulco. It's quite well known among the surfies, there's a good break here, they call it the Mexican Pipeline.

Graham is still going well, chatting up the ladies wherever he can. He will have a bit to tell you I bet when we get back. From the coast at Acapulco and Puerto Escondido we went up into the mountains and on to Palenque, and from there we crossed the river by canoe into Guatemala. We went to Flores and Tikal and a yachties haunt on the Rio Dulce and Lake Izabel. This is a great hurricane hole and there are yachts here from everywhere, mostly America though. It's very hot here but every night we get a heavy rainstorm that cools it down a bit. Our next stop is Guatemala City and then it's on to Costa Rica en route to Panama where we plan to get a yacht going to Cartagena in Colombia. Coming down here by bus we stopped a couple of days in Managua, Nicaragua, and for the first time had stuff stolen from our room. We were ready to leave at 5am and discovered our camera and \$US500 missing. We had to change our bus tickets and report to the police, but the owners of the house where we were staying did their own investigation and hauled up the girl who helped with cleaning. She brought back our camera and \$100 but said she had spent the rest on food. The owners said she had a gangster boyfriend and he had probably taken the money. We were just glad to get back anything, the weird thing was on the camera were photos the girl had taken of herself and family, but not the boyfriend." A letter to members dated 7th April, 19 1994 from Commodore Bill McNeil

1994 - Fundraising for the kitchen Part 1

called on members to contribute towards establishing the kitchen. Here is what Billy had to say.

"Dear member. The Port Douglas Yacht club has come a long way in the last year with the construction of the Club House finally coming to fruition. The support from the members and local business to help

raise the funds without venturing into financial commitments was a tremendous effort. PDYC is a not for profit organisation and is surviving on bar revenue to cover overheads and is currently trading on a General Purpose Permit which limits trading hours considerably. In order to generate more revenue through the club it's vital we get the kitchen up and running. Council has inspected the building and is currently completing a list of requirements necessary to obtaining a Certificate of Classification.

The letter then called on members to lend up to \$1,000 interest free to the club to raise an estimated \$10,000 needed to complete the required work.

"Dr Dick our number one Honorary Life member has already taken up the offer and we currently hold \$1,000 in a special account set up for completion of the Club house. I hope you will consider the above proposal and if you are in a position where you may be able to assist the Club would be truly grateful. Yours sincerely, Bill McNeil.


