

### Ice wins Poseidon Sailaway Winter Series

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
This month's Newsletter sees the start of a new segment brought to you by Doug Ryan, Life Member nominee and skipper of Magic. In the coming months Doug will be passing on some of his wealth of knowledge to help us all sail that little bit better. Great tips for racers, cruisers, skippers and crew alike to help you get the most out of your sailing.



After eight races of the Poseidon Sailaway Winter Series, Ice (6) recorded an emphatic series win followed by Magic (15) and Port FM Mais Oui (16). Following on from a divisional win in the Exemplar Clipper Cup the crew of Ice scored a perfect six after discarding their two worst results leaving six wins from six races. With just four points separating the next three placed boats there was close competition for a place on the podium.

In the 24 race Poseidon Sailaway Club Championship after 16 races Magic (49) holds a one point lead over Ann Sea (50) followed by Ice (57), Tau Ceti (80), Port FM Mais Oui (105), Indigo (125), Miriama (135), Big Ears (153), Ruff Red (160), Jimmie Blacksmith (163) and Sea Wizard (168). With six discarded scores to come into affect mid way through the next series there are several contenders for the crown of Club Champion.

The Poseidon Sailaway Club Championship resumes on September 22<sup>nd</sup> with race 1 and race 2 of the Spring Series.



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#### **Race Report: Winter Series Race 7**

Race 7 of the Poseidon Sailaway Club Championship Winter Series was postponed from the scheduled week due to a strong wind warning but was staged the following week ahead of race 8.

In less than 10 knots of breeze which proved very challenging for the six competing yachts the course was shortened to two laps to allow sufficient time to finish. Magic again showed all the skills of light air sailing to complete the course in 01:27:43 and take line honours and the handicap win ahead of arch rival Ann Sea (01:34:16). Port FM Mais Oui (01:52:34) had to settle for 3<sup>rd</sup> coming in just 17 seconds behind on corrected time ahead of Indigo, Tau Ceti and Miriama.

#### **Race Report: Winter Series Race 8**

Series leader Ice joined the fleet in the afternoon for race 8 and briefly set the pace at the start before being run down by Magic ahead of the first tack. Ann Sea also eased past on the first downwind run as the fleet settled into more light air sailing with an almost flat sea at times. With the course again shortened to two laps it became a race against the clock with Tau Ceti, Indigo and Miriama all coming home just minutes short of the allocated three hour time limit.

Magic (02:06:26) recorded a second line honours win for the day ahead of Ann Sea (02:10:45), Ice (02:19:02) and Port FM Mais Oui (02:48:01) but the time taken was too much to hold on to a win on corrected time. Ice once again slipped into pole position ahead of Ann Sea, Magic and Port FM Mais Oui.

### Cruising around the Cape



#### 2012 Closehaven Trophy Series

Racing in the 2012 Poseidon Sailaway Club Championship takes a break until September 22<sup>nd</sup> as the Closehaven Marina Trophy Series comes into the spot light. The eight race trophy series resumes on July 28<sup>th</sup> with the Two Island Sail & Run followed by the Quicksilver Cup on August 11<sup>th</sup> and the Commodores Cup on August 25<sup>th</sup>. A break for the club championship also means a break from the windward leeward course as the trophy series is completely void of this course. There are many arguments for and against any particular course but the 2012 sailing calendar has been specifically designed to segregate the challenge of the w/l and the more relaxed and fun aspect of more imaginative and unusual configurations. To avoid fluctuations in handicaps caused by different courses separate handicaps are also in play for the two series.

Following a 1<sup>st</sup> in the Closehaven Cup and a 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Keith Quinn Memorial Trophy, T-Break (4) skippered by Robert Mair and crewed by Roxy and Noel is the surprise leader of the series followed by Port FM Mais Oui (6), and Ann Sea (7) and Miriama (7). Magic (12) and Ice (12) are further off the pace, ahead of Tau Ceti (14) and Winkali (16). With the cat Indigo set to enter the series the question on everyone's lips is does the crew of T-Break have dogged determination enough to defend their lead in the series?



### July WAGS roundup

Tau Ceti took the rum ahead of Ice, Port FM Mais Oui, Magic, Miriama, Jimmie Blacksmith, Sinabada, Big Ears, Indigo and Ann Sea. 

### Doug Ryan's Race Tips:

How many of us head out on the race course with the same settings from last weeks race or maybe we haven't changed them all season? So let's start with some light air hints.

- Changing gears
- 1. Ensure back stay is eased. Helps power up the main.
- 2. Maybe less halyard tension on both main and headsail.
- 3. Ease Main outhaul.
- 4. Ensure leech lines are not on too hard, hooking the leach.
- 5. Move crew weight to leeward to help keep the shape in the sail.
- 6. Don't over sheet or set and forget. As pressure changes, trim on the headsail and main should change.

There is a great saying that goes, "When in doubt, let it out." Try it some time you might be surprised. Next newsletter we will deal with stronger wind trim.

In December 2006 many years of catering woes came to an end at PDYC when Matt & Sime signed an agreement to operate Spinnakers Restaurant. A stable and reputable kitchen at the club has played a major role in the success of the club since that time. The original agreement was for three terms each of three years with the option to take up each additional three year term to be finalised three months prior to expiry of the current term. In line with this Matt & Sime have notified the committee of their intention to take up the remaining three year term and indicated their desire to enter into a new agreement following on from this. With a successful kitchen an integral part of a successful club it's great news for the future of PDYC.

### To sail, or not to sail, that is the question:

Borrowing from the famous words of Shakespeare's Hamlet we too must question whether or not to "take Arms against a Sea of troubles" when faced with a strong wind warning.

In 2011 we determined that at club level to be fair to all it's unreasonable to expect skippers and crew to race if there's a strong wind warning for our waters. So we introduced a postponement plan that automatically reschedules the race according to the plan.



However, so far in 2012 on the two occasions we have had such a warning issued on a race day the wind has been nowhere to be seen. Race 4 of the Exemplar Clipper Cup was delayed by 80 minutes as we waited for sufficient wind to start the race. Then for Race 7 of the Poseidon Sailaway Winter Series scheduled for Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> July Low Isles recorded 15 to 18 knots at 2:00pm and again at 2:30pm which would have been ideal had we not automatically postponed the race.

There is no denying that a sea such as that which faced us for WAGS on Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> consistently gusting up to 30 knots can be a sea of troubles. On that occasion it was obvious that the conditions were not suitable and nobody should choose to risk their rig and their crew in such conditions just for a race or a social sail. But the question is raised when the wind we are warned of is not affecting our waters.

The good thing about the current postponement plan is that everybody knows the situation just by looking at the forecast. If there's a warning the race is postponed. If there isn't then the race is on. A boat choosing to heed the warning cannot be disadvantaged by scoring high points for not racing and everybody can plan their day accordingly. What do you think?



### **Club History with Henry Cotter**

Council suspicious over club application for lease of land

Looking through our archives for information for our newsletter I found two documents copied from the local newspaper. Yes, the boys back then negotiated very hard to obtain the ground we now lease and I take my hat off to them. Here is what the newspaper clipping had to say.

Port Douglas Yacht Club has submitted a plan to council for a yacht club on Dickson Inlet despite two Council rejections of the proposal. At last month's Council meeting Council rejected a request for an



The plan to build a yacht club, 25 wet berths, and a hard standing area of 280 sq meters for boat storage and for members to do their own maintenance which would include a 50 ton boat lifter was refused by Council on the grounds that the proposal was premature. The council had yet to decide on how best to use this part of R 177 Local Government (Port Douglas Harbour Reserve.) The council remarked it was only three months since the first application for the yacht club, and the council rejected then on the grounds it was presenting unfair competition to the existing slipway and the area was too large to lease to one concern.

However the yacht club members' have not been daunted by the rejection and have submitted fresh plans to the council detailing exactly how they intend to utilise the one hectare of land.

The club believes the lease of the land would allow a much sort after facility to build and cater for the increasing yachting population. Architects Woodhead Australia has prepared a plan for the yacht club in keeping with Port Douglas architecture.

The club also maintains that an important aspect of the proposal is the provision being made for a junior boat club which would provide a valuable service to members of the community.

The resent application of the Douglas Chamber of Commerce for five hectares of waterfront adjoining the proposed site to be reserved for public access to the inlet was supported by the club.

In the advent of both applications being successful we would endeavour to develop our site to complement the public reserve the club pledged to council. Council however did not view the Yacht Club proposal as a replication for the site.

Following Tuesday's committee meeting chairman of the council Tony Mijo said the club was knocked back on its first application and has not reapplied for a site.

"We thought their resent submission was only asking us to give consideration to the concept rather than a definitive application for a development on a specific site. Because the Council cannot see the club raising the funds for such an ambitions development we remain suspicious that the Club is a front for a local developer. We will need to be convinced the project is financially viable before we give it serious consideration."

### Isetta sets sail


Cruising the south pacific



Ramp revisited Everyone in Port knows how slow the wheels of change can turn but they do continue to turn even though we might not actually see any movement. In the March 2011 Newsletter we brought you a story about the relocation of the public boat ramp to Spinnaker Close and the results of a meeting with Cairns Regional Council to discuss issues affecting PDYC. Following a written submission to CRC in April 2011 detailing the concerns raised by members PDYC has waited for sixteen months for the next instalment in the boat ramp saga. Finally in July 2012 we have received an offer from Council that addresses the issues raised with the relocation of the ramp and the subsequent relocation of the clubs hard stand to accommodate parking facilities. The details of the offer are before the committee with several items needing further discussion.

Though there is still much conjecture as to whether or not the lagoon pool will ever go ahead the demolition of the old buildings along the foreshore off Wharf Street is now a reality and despite the recent improvements to the Ashford Street ramp having just been completed the boat ramp looks certain to be on its way to our doorstep. The committee is determined to secure the best possible outcome for PDYC and most, if not all of our concerns look set to be adequately addressed.

CRC decline request to assist with pontoon A recent submission to Cairns Regional Council requesting assistance to finance a new pontoon for PDYC as identified in the concept design for the Port Douglas Waterfront Master Plan has been rejected. In a letter to Bluesport, the clubs appointed grants application project manager, CRC concluded that the relocation of the boat ramp to Spinnaker Close did not require pontoon facilities and that any development identified in the concept plan was to be the responsibility of whichever entity had an interest in the lease affected by the indicated improvement. Also identified in Councils plan and also not to be financed by CRC is improvement to the revetment wall that has suffered serious erosion over the years.

The provision of a larger and improved pontoon facility has been recognised in the club Future Plan as the number one priority for future capital expense and remains at the top of the list for future development at the club.

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
